St. Thomas University invites applications for instructors to teach the following courses in Fredericton:

Semester 1 (September – December 2025)

ECON-2123-A Quantitative Methods I (M, W, F 11:30 AM - 12:20 PM) An introduction to basic statistical techniques of estimation and inference. The topics covered include: collection, organization and presentation of data, frequency distributions, parameter estimation, probability, probability distributions, tests of hypotheses, confidence intervals, analysis of variance, and index numbers (Maximum enrollment: 60).

ECON-2313-A Multinational Corp. & Trade (M, W 4:00 PM - 5:20 PM) This course deals with the strategies of multinational corporations, the scope and impact of international trade, and the structure of international trade agreements. (Maximum enrollment: 60)

St. Thomas University is an undergraduate, liberal arts institution with a full-time enrolment of 1,600. Its students graduate with Bachelor of Arts, Applied Arts, Education, and Social Work degrees. The faculty members are distinguished teachers, researchers and scholars, and the university holds two Canada Research Chairs.

A PhD, or imminent completion is preferred; a Master's degree in Economics or closely related discipline is required. Each applicant is to submit a curriculum vitae, along with pertinent documentation (ex. teaching portfolio etc.) and arrange to have three letters of reference sent directly to Dr. Fariba Solati, Acting Chair of the Department of Economics, St. Thomas University, Fredericton, NB E3B 5G3.
