St. Thomas University invites internal applications for instructors to teach the following course in Fredericton:

Semester 2: (January – April 2025)

POLS 2313A Comparative Politics of the Developing Areas, T/TH 1:00 PM – 2:20 PM

This course introduces students to the comparative study of governments in the developing world. It focuses on such issues as the politics of development, modernization, and the interplay of political and social forces in selected developing nations. Prerequisite: 3 credits in Political Science.

St. Thomas University is an undergraduate, liberal arts institution with a full-time enrolment of 1,600. Its students graduate with Bachelor of Arts, Applied Arts, Education, and Social Work degrees. The faculty members are distinguished teachers, researchers and scholars, and the university holds two Canada Research Chairs.

A PhD, or imminent completion is preferred; a Master's degree or equivalent professional experience is required. Each applicant is to submit a curriculum vitae, along with pertinent documentation (ex. teaching portfolio etc.) and arrange to have three letters of reference sent directly to Dr. Shaun Narine, Chair, Department of Political Science, St. Thomas University, Fredericton, NB E3B 5G3.
