

## Part-Time Positions in Social Work

St. Thomas University invites applications for an instructor to teach the following courses in Sackville, New Brunswick during intersession (exact dates noted in the course description).

**SCWK 5013 MW Group Work Theory & Design**, May 5<sup>th</sup> & 6<sup>th</sup> - Monday & Tuesday and June 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup>  
Monday & Tuesday from 9:00 AM – 4:00 PM

This is a laboratory course in which students will develop skills in group membership, leadership, and program design. Practical group experiences and reflection activities are utilized to demonstrate theories of group dynamics and development, and to enhance group assessment and intervention skills.

**SCWK 5116 MW Generalist Social Work Practice Skills**, May 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup> & 9<sup>th</sup>-Wednesday, Thursday & Friday  
and June 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> & 6<sup>th</sup>-Wednesday, Thursday & Friday, 9:00am-4:00pm

This course is an introduction to the theory and skills of helping Indigenous individuals and families. The course will focus on understanding the stages of the helping process, exploring professional and personal values and ethics, and the acquisition of specific skills in communicating, assessing problems, planning, contracting, implementing change, evaluating, and terminating the process. In addition, the course will include the study of theory and skills related to practice situations and issues that commonly arise in a variety of social work contexts, critical exploration of the effects of oppression and marginalization on individuals' unique experiences of struggle and distress, and the promotion of empowering and anti-oppressive practice. (6 credit hours).

Experience practicing social work in a First Nation community would be considered an asset.
