St. Thomas University invites applications for instructors to teach the following courses in Fredericton:

Semester 1 (September – December 2025)

COPP-2023A Public Engagement (T, Th 11:30 AM-12:50 PM). This course will explore how social media and internet tools are transforming the world of communications and public policy. The course will explore cases around the world where social media and the access to information on the internet is influencing public policy and the political process. Prerequisite: COPP 2013. (Maximum enrollment: 60)
