

Part-Time Positions in Elsipogtog (EXTERNAL)

St. Thomas University invites applications for instructors to teach the following courses in person in Elsipogtog First Nation:

Semester 1 (September – December 2025)

NATI-1006-Y Introduction to Native Studies (T, TH 1:30 PM-2:50 PM – Semester 1 only) A survey course that introduces students to the discipline of Native Studies. Its purpose is to increase the student's understanding and sensitivity towards the past and present experience of Native peoples. The course will examine precontact history; the influences of colonialism and primitive accumulation/capitalism in the postcontact era; and contemporary issues - while emphasizing a historical and materialist perspective. (Maximum enrollment: 60)

SCWK-2013-Y Introduction to Social Welfare (T, TH 12:00 PM - 1:20 PM) An examination of the history, philosophy, and development of social welfare as a social institution in New Brunswick and elsewhere. Analysis of the institution and its relationship to the history, philosophy, and values of the profession of social work. (Maximum enrollment: 60)

Semester 2 (January – April 2026)

SCWK-2023-Y Introduction to Social Work (T, TH 12:00 PM - 1:20 PM) An introduction to the values, ethics, history, and methods of professional social work practice, with particular emphasis on the profession in New Brunswick. An introduction to generic practice and social work with various client groups. (Maximum enrollment: 60)

The faculty members are distinguished teachers, researchers and scholars, and the university holds two Canada Research Chairs.
